

#### First Holy Communion Preparation

Each year, during the Lenten season, we prepare our children to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion with a series of class sessions that they might have a beginning understanding of the background and meaning of our Lord's Supper, of how Jesus offers us his own body and blood in the bread and wine we share together in worship. This preparatory program is open to active church families whose children are in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and older – based on your sense of your child's readiness to participate and receive the Sacrament.

This spring we will continue this tradition with class sessions on Saturday mornings, April 2<sup>nd</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>, leading up to the participants receiving Holy Communion in worship on Palm Sunday, April 10<sup>th</sup>. These two classes are for our children in both congregations – class on April 2<sup>nd</sup> will be held at Holy Trinity in Palmerton from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, while class on April 9<sup>th</sup> will be held at St. Matthew's in North Weissport from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and will include baking Communion bread. All those being prepared should attend both classes. Letters will be going out to those families with children who we believe are of age to be prepared and included this year. If you do not receive a letter by Sunday, March 20<sup>th</sup>, and believe that your child is of age to receive, please contact the church office.

### From the Pastor's Desk – March 2022 The Storyteller

"What do you believe about the Bible?" The question was asked of me, once upon a time, by a member of a call committee as I began the call process at a church that I did wind up serving as pastor many years ago. I've been asked any number of things by call committee members over the years. I have served six different churches over my forty years of ministry, not counting short term stints as designated pastor at a few others. Immediately I wondered what this person was looking for as she asked the question. What did she want me to say? Was there something I might say that would be a deal breaker in her estimation? I answered that the Scriptures are the inspired Word of God, that they are the authority for us in the church for the way we believe, preach, and live our lives of faith in the world (well, something like that). She seemed to be okay with that. The interview went on and, over the course of the next weeks and months. I DID wind up getting that call.

What do you believe about the Bible? -Yes - YOU - What do YOU believe about the Bible? There's an old acrostic that says that BIBLE = Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth. While that might seem cute, I don't find it all that helpful. We tend to find in the Bible what we want to find. There's so much in the 66 books - 39 in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament – that it can seem overwhelming and intimidating so we break it down, we simplify it, in order to come up with something we can manage. We pick one part, one aspect, and make that the whole. Does the Bible contain instruction? Of course it does. Does the Bible contain law and commandment? Yes, ves indeed. But is that the whole of what we find in the Bible? By no means. So much of what we find in

the Bible are stories – stories about Adam and Eve, about Noah and the great flood, about Abraham and Sarah and their descendants: Isaac, Jacob, & Joseph and his brothers and sisters, about Moses, about the leaders of Israel and on and on through the Old Testament and right on into the New Testament. Jesus was a storyteller. Was he a teacher? Of course, but so much of his teaching was done through the telling of stories that we often refer to as parables.

In Luke 15, a portion of which we will hear this Lenten season, Jesus tells a set of three stories about lost things and people – a lost sheep, a lost coin, and a lost son. That last parable we often call The Prodigal Son. Why did Jesus tell these stories? Who was he talking to, and why? Luke tells us at the beginning of the chapter – "Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, 'This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So Jesus told them this parable . . ."

Do you know the story? The younger of two sons makes some rather impulsive decisions, demands money from his father, and goes off into the world where he blows it all and winds up lower than lower. Seeing no other path forward, he decides to go home, hoping at best to be allowed to serve as a slave in his father's house. But as he comes near to the house his father sees him and runs - RUNS - to him, rejoicing that his son who had been lost was now found. So grateful to have him back safe. he throws a big party for him and grants him welcome and restoration to his position not as a slave or a servant, but with full honor as a son. At this, the older brother is furious, believing that his kid brother deserves none of it. Just as the father had gone out to meet the returning prodigal, he goes out to talk with his older son trying to reason with him.

It's just a story, right? It didn't really

happen. And yet, it is an incredibly powerful way of getting a point across - a message of undeserved grace, of forgiveness, mercy, and love. That's the power of story. Through the stories that fill the Bible. God reveals to us the powerful, transforming message of God's redeeming love for God's people - for all of us. If we focus on the laws and the commandments, we get so preoccupied with what we need to do to earn God's approval and we will always wonder if we've done enough - if we can ever do enough. If we pay attention to the stories, to what God has done through the ages in calling a people to himself, of calling and welcoming those the world has pushed to the margins, doing everything necessary to keep them in relationship with himself, we will be overwhelmed with a sense of God's saving love that leads to peace - not fear, of comfort - not anxiety.

This month we begin another Lenten season – another journey with Jesus to Judea, to Jerusalem, and to the cross. Pay attention to the stories. Don't look for what you need to do. Look instead at all that God has done for you in Jesus. You are loved. You have been redeemed. Rejoice in the grace and mercy of God for sinners just like you and me.

# ASH WEDNESDAY – Wed., March 2, 7:00pm, St. Matthew's

The season of Lent begins this year on March 2<sup>nd</sup> and we gather in worship at 7:00 p.m. at St. Matthew's, North Weissport, for our service of Confession, the Imposition of Ashes, and the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

In the season of Lent we play a bit of "let's pretend". The overarching truth is that we know that Jesus was crucified and, then, on the third day was raised gloriously to life never to die again. The good news is that our sins, that are many, are forgiven for Christ's sake and we bear them no more. In this Lenten season, though, we consider the seriousness

of our sin, how far short we fall of the holiness to which God calls us, and the severity of the punishment we so justly deserve. In humility, we meditate on God's righteousness, on our brokenness, on what true justice would be, and on our plea for mercy to a holy God. Were it not for God's revelation of love and grace in Jesus we would have no hope whatsoever. We are justly under God's judgment and deserve condemnation. But in Jesus we are forgiven and declared righteous.

Join us for worship on Ash Wednesday. Receive this sign of your mortality on your forehead in a cross-shaped smudge of ash. Then, gratefully receive Christ's own Body and Blood in the bread and wine of Holy Communion, and know that we have redemption, the forgiveness of our sins.

We hope you will join us.

# Lent 2022 – Midweek Worship – CONVICTED

This Lenten Season our Midweek Worship series will be entitled "Convicted". These services will enable our congregations to step into a courtroom situation. Each Convicted service puts a different biblical person on trial, accused of an actual crime. An overall guiding question leads the arguments of each case while you, the members of the congregation serve as the jury. Over the weeks, we will have the disciples as a group as defendants, then Judas, Peter, Pontius Pilate, and finally Barabbas. The charges will vary from defamation of character, dereliction of duty, treason, perjury, obstruction of justice, and rebellion.

Beloved Members of our Synod,

At its January meeting, the Synod Council made the difficult decision to once again hold the Synod Assembly online instead of gathering in person. We know this decision may come as a disappointment to you, and I'd like to explain how the Council came to its decision.

First, please know the decision wasn't easy, nor was it unanimous; however, the decision to move online did pass with an overwhelming majority voting in favor. Initially, many council members, like you, very much wanted to hold the assembly in person and gather as planned in Reading. But in discussion, a few realities just could not be overcome: vaccines were still not available for our youngest children (ages 0-4), a new variant was ushering in extremely high transmission numbers, and our local hospitals were struggling to keep abreast of testing and available beds. Given the swift onset and spread of the Omicron variant, the council wondered at the possibility of a new variant emerging at the time of the Synod Assembly. Like you, we just simply can't see into the future.

The gravity of these unknowns increased when coupled with the fact that there was a significant down payment cost for the facility – a cost we could not recoup even if, for whatever reason, we needed to cancel or downsize the Assembly. Use it, or lose it. As long as I have been chairing Synod Council meetings, I have never witnessed the Council making spendthrift decisions. Each financial decision is taken on deliberately and with care, the council focusing on being good stewards always and in every way. It was, in the end, a financial risk too great to take.

So, once again, we will see you online on June 10th and 11th. But we hope you will find a way to see each other in person, gathering safely in smaller numbers as the situation allows, and enjoying each other's company as we get the business done and see what's happening around our Synod and throughout the ELCA.
