# From the Pastor's Desk - February 2023

#### "I Can't Help Myself!"

I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I who do it but sin that dwells within me. For I know that the good does not dwell within me, that is, in my flesh. For the desire to do the good lies close at hand, but not the ability. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I who do it but sin that dwells within me.

So I find it to be a law that, when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched person that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

I've been there, haven't you? Ginny taught 1st grade for many, many years. I had the opportunity to watch her teach, to see her interact with her students. It was through her that I first caught on to the idea of "good choices" and choices that weren't all that good. She has remarkable patience. She had it in her teaching days and she has it at home with every member of our family. Honestly, I'm not as patient as I could be, as I should be. How often do we catch ourselves, in that split second after we've done or said something, realizing that we'd made a rather poor choice? We could have made a better choice, reacted in a different way, not responded in anger or frustration, not said what we allowed to blurt out of our mouth unchecked.

We know better, of course. We're better people than that, aren't we? Sure we are, but it still happens. Paul says, "I don't understand my own actions." He knows what he should do, what he should say, but time and time again he does or says the wrong thing. He knows God's holy law, knows how he should live as a child of God but, where the rubber meets the road, he

fails – the desire to do good is there, but not the ability. How is that even possible? What is it? "The law of sin that dwells in my members" Paul says.

We're sinners. We were sinners before we came to faith and, even now, we are still sinners – redeemed sinners to be sure – but sinners just the same. That struggle is ever present in us. Thinking we are good enough, faithful enough, smart enough on our own is believing the Devil's own lie.

Martin Luther, in his Small Catechism, explains the significance of Holy Baptism in our daily lives this way: "(Baptism) signifies that the old person in us with all its sins and evil desires is to be drowned and die through daily sorrow for sin and through repentance, and on the other hand that daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever."


This month we move from the Epiphany season, having experienced the revelation of who Jesus is as the Incarnate Son of God, into the season of Lent (Ash Wednesday coming on February 22). It is the theme, the purpose of Lent, that we look at who we are as we stand before God. We allow God's holy Word, the law, to function as a mirror in which we see the truth of ourselves – warts and all. The more we allow this truth in to our mind and heart, the more we are driven to our knees before God, asking for his grace and mercy which is the

asking for his grace and mercy which is the forgiveness of our sins. That gift of forgiveness came to us first, we must remember, in our baptism but we need to receive it again and again in the words of absolution and in our reception of Christ's Body and Blood in Holy Communion. It is never my possession. The more I think I've got it, that I understand it and can move on by my own strength, the more I show just how lost I am apart from the daily gift of life and grace in Christ. It always comes from outside myself – I must hear it, I must

receive it and trust in God's grace rather

than anything in me.

I make choices each and every day that are less than the best. I speak before I think. I act out of selfishness, out of anger, out of frustration. I tell you this as your pastor. It is only by God's daily gifts of grace in Word and Sacrament that I am able to live as a beloved and forgiven child of God in Jesus Christ – no different from you. Thanks be to God that these abundant blessings are always poured out for us as we pray, as we dig into the Scriptures, and as we gather together for worship.

# FriEDENS: An Amazing Garden Story


A few weeks after the lockdown in the spring of 2020, I called a neighbor in town who had a garden in her front yard. It's Shartlesville, and the PA Dutch are used to their yards looking \*just so,\* so I knew this was a brave woman who loved gardening vegetables more than public opinion. I also knew she didn't have room for pumpkins in her small yard, so I called and proposed we plant some viney crops up on our church property. She agreed and even had the seeds, gardening skills, and ideas, so after consultation with council, the garden was born. We sent our crop to the neighboring UCC congregation's food pantry, and with the excess had physically- distant free produce giveaways.

In 2021, we expanded the garden by half, to about 50 by 75 feet. We watered each plant via a recycled gallon milk jug with a pinprick in the bottom. The plants were happy, but our backs were not. It took 45 minutes to an hour to water all the jugs, which we did nearly every day because the garden is in full sun. The black plastic we used for weed suppression became a slip-and-slide while we irrigated.

In 2022, we were able to install a drip irrigation system that did not require filling milk jugs and weed suppression fabric that was not slippery. The fabric required using a blow torch to make holes for planting but will be able to be used for multiple years. The irrigation only required turning on the spigot and letting it run for several hours, which was a true God-send because we had some unexpected health issues on the garden team that limited our volunteer force! It was an extraordinarily dry summer, so the grant came just in time.

This past summer we had 21 people volunteer in the garden, took produce to 5 food pantries or senior centers, including Cafe Esperanza in Reading, and welcomed 29 people into the garden at a joint VBS. Not only are we feeding our neighbors with free, fresh, pesticide-free produce, but we are also getting to know our neighbors, developing new connections in the congregation among volunteers, teaching children about food insecurity and the joy of gardening, and passing on agricultural wisdom.
