

"The Fear of the Lord"

The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge;

fools despise wisdom and instruction.
Proverbs 1:7 (NRSVUE)

The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom; all those who practice it have a good understanding. His praise endures forever.

Psalm 111:9-10 (NRSVUE)

In one of my previous calls, I had a church member who had grown up in a very traditional Roman Catholic parish in Philadelphia. She and her husband had become members of our Lutheran Church but, in many ways, she had never lost that strict Catholic view of things. One aspect of her upbringing, expressed both in her parents and her priests, was an understanding of "the FEAR of the Lord." For her it meant that she believed God was to be feared. She had grown up afraid of God. Even as we talked about the mercy and grace of God, his forgiving love in Jesus Christ, there was in her a fear - a fear of judgment and condemnation - should she fall short of the holiness God required.

Martin Luther was raised in a very similar fashion. It was a monumental breakthrough, a truly transformational experience for him to understand that God had, in love, given us salvation in Jesus Christ apart from our proper religious behavior, apart from works of the law. It was that experience, first realized as he read Paul's letter to the Church in Rome, that motivated his desire to reform the Church on the basis of the gospel of God's saving grace in Jesus Christ,

through faith alone.

This month our Gospel readings from Matthew describe a number of miracles performed by Jesus – the feeding of the multitude, his walking on the sea and calming the storm, and the exorcism of a demon from the daughter of the Canaanite woman. What would you come to believe if you had personally witnessed such mighty acts? In response to seeing Jesus walking on the sea and calming the storm the disciples "worshiped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God."

While the Old Testament often uses the expression, "the Fear of the LORD". I believe we need to consider what that means for us. Is it right that we should be afraid of God? As we read so many stories in the Old Testament in which God strikes down those who are faithless, disobedient, and unbelieving; we can easily come to believe that we could rightly be afraid of this God. We are not worthy. We are everything those Israelites were and more. We are sinners and we deserve nothing but judgment from the holy and righteous God. Nevertheless, in Jesus Christ, we see the covenant love and grace of God, the One who keeps his promises to his people in spite of their (our) sin.

In these miracle stories we see the power of God in Jesus Christ – power over the things of this earth and over the power of the devil. In Jesus we see the awesome power of God. If we were unaware of God's love for sinners, it would be right for us to fear that power. Even knowing that we are loved, it is right for us to be in awe of the transcendent power of God. God, in his pure Divine power, is beyond our ability to comprehend. The One who created all that exists by the power of his Word, is not to be trifled with.

I believe the right word in all of this is awe. A proper awe and respect for who God is keeps all things in proper perspective. God is God and we are not. We dare not domesticate God. We dare not believe that we are capable of understanding all that God is. The British writer J B Philipps wrote a book back in the day entitled, "Your God is Too Small." He wrote about our trying to keep God in a box, bound up by our own understanding. God is so much more – more powerful and more holy, more loving and more gracious than we can wrap our heads around. Those who personally witnessed his miraculous power were amazed and, in response, they worshiped God.

As we hear these stories this month, may we be moved to a proper respect and awe, to a true fear of the Lord, which is the beginning both of knowledge and wisdom. May we be moved to worship him for all that he has done for us in Jesus Christ.


RACIAL JUSTICE TRAINING FOR ROSTERED LEADERS

As per "Resolution: Anti-Racism Education Emphasis" submitted to the 2022 Synod Assembly and passed at the July 2022 meeting of the Synod Council, all NEPA Synod rostered leaders (pastors and deacons) and synodically authorized lay leaders are required to have Anti-Racism Training at least every 3 years, at the same cost as Boundary Training. To help meet this requirement, the Synod Racial Justice Team has scheduled two training events for Fall 2023, for those who were not able to attend one of the Winter 2023 sessions. **Lay Leaders are also welcome to attend.**

The eHarmony of Prison Reentry STORYTELLING ENGAGEMENT

A story from our Grand Canyon Synod

Over 600,000 people are released from prison every year, and as they struggle to rejoin society, they face barriers to connecting with reentry service providers. We are honored that so many of our synods and congregations are active in prison ministry; yet they know the challenge of finding reliable and effective resources to support folks once they've been released.

Our synods are supporting reentry ministry: the Metropolitan Chicago Synod helped start the work and the Grand Canyon Synod has launched the innovative online resource the <u>Inside Out Network (ION)</u>, a one-of-a-kind platform that helps returning citizens connect with the support they need for a successful reentry. The Grand Canyon Synod has made a strong commitment, awarding ION an "Adapting, Connecting, Transforming and Sustaining" grant so it can help people access ministries and service providers.

ION is a bit like eHarmony: returning citizens and service providers can find each other and exchange messages, even before release, to make sure returning citizens get the support they need as soon after release as possible. What started as a prison ministry from an ELCA church in the Chicago area is now operating in Illinois and Arizona and launching soon in Oregon, with 6,400 returning citizens and 443 service providers and ministries enrolled. ION is always free to returning citizens, and service providers participate free of charge for a year before paying a modest annual fee.

With the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions, ION has gone into Arizona prisons to train staff on using the platform. This has led to inmates enrolling before their release; reports indicate that as release approaches, they are less anxious, seeing ahead of time what help will be available.

ION values its partnerships with ministry and is currently developing a Reentry Congregational Initiative, gathering insights from faith communities that intentionally minister to returning citizens. Many ELCA congregations work in this area, and we welcome any insights they might provide by completing this <u>survey</u> (https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/SLFWMLS). ION intends to develop a guidebook called "Effective Reentry Ministry for Ordinary Congregations"; its valuable "Spiritual Survival Guide for Prison and Beyond" can be read or downloaded free of charge from the ION website at <u>insideoutnetwork.net/resources</u>.
