From the Pastor's Desk –

September 2023 "You're Setting Your Mind on Human Things"

²¹From that time on, Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes and be killed and on the third day be raised, ²² And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." ²³ But he turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a hindrance to me, for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

²⁴ Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any wish to come after me, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ²⁵ For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. ²⁶ For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life?

Matthew 16:21-26 (NRSVUE)

On August 27 and September 3, we have the two parts of the story of Peter's bold confession of faith and, then, how he shows that he really doesn't get it as much as he thinks he does. As I say so often, Peter is a model for us all. He reflects the best of trusting faith in Jesus and, in a flash, in the next moment, he walks it back and seems for all the world like a thick-headed Dutchman without a clue.

Peter truly does believe. He is convinced that Jesus is Messiah, the long awaited Redeemer that God promised for Israel. He has seen it in what Jesus has done and he has heard it in what Jesus has said. In response to his declaration, Jesus said that this realization was not something Peter

figured out on his own. Rather, it was revealed to him by the Holy Spirit.

Next Jesus begins to break the news to the disciples that, in Jerusalem, he will suffer at the hands of Israel's religious leaders, that he will be put to death and then be raised on the third day. Understandably, if you think about it, this is more than Peter can wrap his head around. Jesus is Messiah. How could Israel's spiritual leaders fail to see the truth? Jesus is Messiah. Surely, he can't die. It was too much and Peter had to say something. Matthew tells us that Peter takes Jesus aside and rebukes him, "God forbid it, Lord!" Bad move, Pete.

Jesus turns on Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a hindrance to me, for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

Satan! Really, Jesus? A bit harsh, don't you think?

What we know as the name of the Devil, "Satan", is a Hebrew word, which means "adversary." Isn't that precisely what Peter has done here? He set himself on the other side from what Jesus declared was going to happen. He wasn't content with what the will of the Lord was and stood against it. He was exactly what Jesus said – an adversary set against Jesus.

How often do we do the same? We believe. Of course, we do. But there is so much that is beyond our comprehension. We can't help but see things through human eyes. It's all we've got.

Then Jesus teaches the disciples about what true discipleship is all about – *deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow me.* Self-denial is difficult, if not impossible. But that's what Jesus asks for. Taking up our cross, quite literally, means a willingness to die. That's what the cross is. It was the Roman method of execution, and perhaps the most brutal one ever devised. Accept the end of your life for Jesus' sake and for the sake of your neighbor. Stop thinking the way

you've always thought. Stop being concerned with how things might adversely affect you and commit yourself to the will of God and the good of your neighbor, even the neighbor you've never liked, never gotten along with - you know . . .that guy.

Truth is . . . It is impossible. I cannot do it. Peter couldn't get beyond his sense of what and who Messiah was supposed to be. Peter was stuck but over time, even after he denied Jesus to save his own skin. the Holy Spirit did the work God always does for us and God's forgiving grace moved Peter forward in faith and in ministry. God has already done that work in vou and in me. In the middle of our human thinking, in our stuck-ness, the Spirit HAS worked, and God's forgiving grace has been poured out for us. In Holy Baptism you were drowned - your sinful human nature put to death in the waters of baptism - and you were raised to new life in the power of Jesus' resurrection.

So ... we follow Jesus the best we can. We love God and we love our neighbors in the power of the Holy Spirit, ever grateful for all that God has done for us in the death and resurrection of Jesus. We put God first. others second, and ourselves third/last. We do it badly because we are still stuck but we us know. are forgiven again and again for Jesus' sake. Jesus is Messiah. He is our Redeemer. Our life is in Him.



Dear Pastor Frost,

Berks County is a special community in many ways; this was especially evident in the wake of the tragedy that struck R.M. Palmer and the West Reading area earlier this year. You, along with more than 1,900 individuals, families and organizations across the county, and country, shared your concern and generosity with those impacted by the tragedy. We are grateful for your donation to the West Reading Disaster Relief Fund.

Just over \$1,000,000 was donated to the fund since it was established on March 25, 2023 by the Berks County Community Foundation and United Way of Berks County. Thanks to the incredible support you and others shared, \$990,000 has been distributed to the families of those who died and to those displaced from their home. In addition, a small portion of the fund will be used by West Reading Borough to create a tribute honoring both the memory of those impacted and the heroic efforts of first responders.

As we reached out to the families of the deceased and those who were displaced from their homes, they expressed their sincere gratitude for the kind-heartedness of strangers as they coped with the unthinkable. We were also asked to share the following: "The Palmer family personally thanks you for the support you have shown for all the Palmer associates and the West Reading community. We are overwhelmed by everybody's generosity." Your compassion has helped individuals and families during their greatest time of need. Our hope is the funding has eased some of the burden during this difficult time as they cope with their loss. On behalf of those individuals receiving your support, thank you for your thoughtfulness and generosity.
