From the Pastor's Desk – November 2023



"Thanksgiving"

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵ Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. ⁶ Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Philippians 4:4-7(NRSVA)

When the calendar turns to November, my mind shoots to the latter part of the month and I'm ready for Thanksgiving. The passage posted at the head of my thoughts was our reading in worship back on the 15th of October. It is one of the first passages I think of when I think about Thanksgiving.

Here, Paul puts thanksgiving in the context of prayer and in the absence of worry or anxiety. Do not be anxious about anything. That is a hard thing for many of us in these days, but if we place all that we are and all that we have in the Lord's hands, it is that much easier. Don't worry about anything. Rather, in everything, by prayer and supplication . . . let your requests be made known to God.

Prayer changes things. No doubt you've heard that little phrase before. When I hear that declaration, I always want to ask the question – What does it change? AND How does it change those things? I often have the feeling that what we want to think is that my prayer changes

the mind of God so that God will act according to my wants and needs, perhaps differently than God might have acted otherwise. There are a couple Old Testament stories in which it at least seems as if God changes his mind on something he was going to do at the request of one of the prominent characters – Abraham in one instance and Moses in the other. When we pray . . . when we bring our requests to God . . . are we intending to change God's mind? Do we believe we have the ability to accomplish such a thing?

It has been suggested that, when asked a similar question on the efficacy of prayer, the great British writer CS Lewis answered that he didn't pray intending to change God but that he, himself, might be changed by the reality of prayer. What do you make of that? Prayer is the living out of the intimate relationship God has made with us in Holy Baptism. As the beloved children of God, we are given the amazing privilege of prayer, the gift of open communication with God. When we call on his name (that God has given us, told us his name is itself a remarkable gift), God hears and responds out of the abundance of grace, mercy, and love in Jesus Christ our Lord. In John 10, often called the Good Shepherd chapter, Jesus declares that God desires that we have abundant life in relationship with him. God wants the best for us. The more we open ourselves to God in prayer; the more we are aware of his presence in every aspect of life, in every moment of every day; the more our will (our wants and desires) will become aligned with that which God wants for us.

Ultimately, this will lead us to offer our prayers in thanksgiving for all that God has already done for us and given to us in Christ Jesus. Our first thanksgiving is for life itself, for our physical lives and all that God has provided us in and for this life –

all of this in the order of creation. Second, but more significant by far, is our gratitude for the gift of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord; that by his passion, death, and resurrection we should be the recipients of forgiveness, life, and salvation – all of this in the order of redemption. As we abide in him and he in us, we are drawn to know that there is nothing that has not, is not, and will not be given to us and done for us in God's abiding love for us.

As Paul writes to his friends, his sisters and brothers in the church in Philippi, the intimacy of prayer and an attitude of gratitude will bring us to the place where both joy and peace become the realities of our lives. "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice!" And then, "The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

We are busy bees and let's keep buzzing around!



Interconnected, Diverse, and Wild Creation

Have you ever worked on a crochet or knit project, and got to a point where your yarn ends up tied in a bird nest-looking mess? Or maybe you're one that works with a fishing line, and while re-spooling a reel you end up with a knot with loops and swoops that make you scratch your head and wonder, "Now what?"

I've noticed that when I experience the dilemma of a knotted skein, I feel frustration and anger. If I'm not in my clearest headspace, I will reactively pull one loop at a time, looking for one with any ability to move. "This one moves? Great!" I'll pull it in either direction until it stops. Still knotted? Find another! And again, and again. If I'm not careful I can end up tightening the knot even further, never to be unwound and destined for the scrap pile.

On my clearer days, I can take a jumbled mess of a knot and get it unwound and collected into a smaller ball of yarn without even needing to cut it from the rest! In Times like this, I have found, that the frustration and the anger are still present, yet in letting them pass while I pause, I create the opportunity to take care and intention in my untangling.

I wonder if God feels like that sometimes when, as the interconnected, diverse, and wild Creation that God so deeply loves, we get ourselves all knotted up through broken relationships, judgments, and ignorant acts. I wonder, does God reactively start pulling at us to take action? Does God accept our jumbled mess, allowing us to make different choices and seek right relationships that honor our connectedness? Does God enjoy the feeling of seeing us come together to co-create something new and beautiful?

May you know and trust that the One who has knit you together in the womb is the One who is eager and ready to create goodness and mercy in and through you this day and always. Blessings on your detangling.
