

From the Pastor's Desk – December 2023

"All in The Family"

12-16 When the Babylonian exile ended, Jeconiah had Shealtiel, Shealtiel had Zerubbabel, Zerubbabel had Abiud, Abjud had Eliakim, Eliakim had Azor, Azor had Zadok. Zadok had Achim. Achim had Eliud, Eliud had Eleazar. Eleazar had Matthan, Matthan had Jacob. Jacob had Joseph, Mary's husband, the Mary who gave birth to Jesus, the Jesus who was called Christ. ¹⁷ There were fourteen generations from Abraham to David, another fourteen from David to the Babylonian exile, and vet another fourteen from the Babylonian exile to Christ. Matthew 1:12-17 (The Message)

This, from Eugene Peterson in his preface to The Gospel of Matthew, in The Message 100 – The Story of God in Sequence:

"The story of Jesus doesn't begin with Jesus. God had been at work for a long time. Salvation, which is the main business of Jesus, is an old business. Jesus is the coming together in final form of themes and energies and movements that had been set in motion before the foundation of the world." (p. 1383, The Message 100)

I've long been intrigued by the genealogy that Matthew uses to begin his story of the life and ministry of Jesus. Above you see just the last third of that list of the family line of Joseph, the husband of Mary, the mother of Jesus. Who were those men? What was the nature of their lives? How did they live? What sort of work did they do? I think it fair to say that neither Abiud nor Azor nor Eliud had the slightest inkling that

they would be the ancestor, in any way, of Messiah, of the Redeemer of God's people Israel or, more broadly, of the Savior of the world. Yet here are their names standing in Holy Scripture in Matthew's account of the family line of Jesus.

In Peterson's introductory words, quoted above, he declares that what God was up to in Jesus, God's work of salvation, had been set in motion before creation, before there was anything but God. Even without knowing it, men and women going about the routines of their daily lives in this world, were carrying out their part in God's eternal plan for the salvation of the world in Jesus of Nazareth, this Jesus who was called Christ.

This day - the day in which you are reading these words of mine - is part of time on this side of the story of Jesus. For us, the incarnation of the Eternal Son of God is part of our human history. This Jesus was born of the Virgin Mary. He was raised in the household of Mary and her husband Joseph. He was, at thirty years of age, baptized by John at the Jordan River. In time he entered the Holy City where he suffered at the hands of the authorities, both political and religious. He was sentenced to death and was executed on a Roman cross. his lifeless body was buried in a borrowed tomb. On the third day he was raised from death and appeared to those who knew him and had followed him.

Now you and I are part of the story of Jesus. Not unlike Abiud, Azor, or Eliud, we have a role to play in God's plan of salvation. As you go about your daily tasks, the routines of everyday life, you are a part of the story. Your choices, your behavior, your actions speak a word of faith, a word of the love of God in Jesus Christ. You are one way in which Jesus comes into the lives of those with whom you come into contact. Your kindness, your cheerfulness, your helpfulness, your love, your encouragement and support are the touch of Jesus on their

lives. In the hectic rush of this season, in all of the rushing around and busyness, be aware of the people you meet. See them. Really see them in that moment. Know that they are loved by God and strive to be a way they may feel and know that love.

Christmas is about the love of God breaking into this world in Jesus so that life and salvation might be made known, might be realized and experienced by each and every person. How can you hear and answer God's call? How can you make God's love known in real ways by those you meet?





Young Adult in Global Mission: A Year in Senegal Asalaa maalekum. May God's peace be upon you.

My name is Quentin Bernhard. I recently served with the ELCA program Young Adults in Global Mission—YAGM—in Senegal. My time with YAGM came to an end in July, and Senegal country cohort peers and I returned to the United States. We are among the 23 young adults from the 2022-2023 year who served in accompaniment in four different country programs.


I live in New Tripoli in Lehigh County, and I'm a member of New Life Lutheran Church in New Tripoli. Many individuals and congregations from our synod supported me in my YAGM year. Thank you for your support of my time in Senegal and for the opportunity to be in continuing relationship after my time abroad.

My coming to the United States, to the communities I grew up in in Pennsylvania, was also my leaving a community I grew in—a community I grew in as a Lutheran and as a young person, one I have good friends in. I lived in Yeumbeul Bene Baraque, in western Senegal, for ten months. I lived with a host family in a community. I saw friends every day, many when at my placement site. Connected with our partner organization Senegalese Lutheran Development Services—SLDS—I worked in a community center that serves the community in numerous ways, splitting my time between the library and the mutual fund credit union.

My friends and family in Senegal continue to send me voice messages, reminding me that I am also Maguette Ndiaye, my Senegalese name, and reminding me that we are still connected, even if connected in a different way now. Our relationships and our future—all of our future—is unknown to us. Our faith—and our trust in one another—can allow us to take steps and leaps in that future.
