From the Pastor's Desk – December 2024 "Hope in the Lord"

¹³ When God made his promise to Abraham, since there was no one greater for him to swear by, he swore by himself, ¹⁴ saying, "I will surely bless you and give you many descendants." ¹⁵ And so after waiting patiently, Abraham received what was promised.

¹⁶ People swear by someone greater than themselves, and the oath confirms what is said and puts an end to all argument. ¹⁷ Because God wanted to make the unchanging nature of his purpose very clear to the heirs of what was promised, he confirmed it with an oath. ¹⁸ God did this so that, by two unchangeable things in which it is impossible for God to lie, we who have fled to take hold of the hope set before us may be greatly encouraged. ¹⁹ We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure. It enters the inner sanctuary behind the curtain, ²⁰ where our forerunner, Jesus, has entered on our behalf. He has become a high priest forever, in the order of Melchizedek. (Hebrews 6:13-20 NIV)

Welcome to Advent! If there is a single season in the church year that we just don't understand, surely it is Advent. This year the Advent season runs day for day with the month of December, the first Sunday being December 1st. As we all know all too well, the world has been in Christmas mode since (if not before) the Halloween candy and costumes were pulled off the shelves. Our daughter told us this past Saturday (Nov. 9) that Sirius XM Satellite Radio had already started running their Christmas music stations. NO! I have not and will not be listening to them for many weeks, well into December.

What is Advent? Advent is characterized by John the Baptizer, telling the people of God to prepare their hearts, their minds, and their lives for the coming of God's long promised Redeemer, the Messiah. We don't begin the celebration until we have gotten ourselves properly prepared for the One who is coming. We wait, but that waiting is far from passive.

The theme of Advent is HOPE. Because we know the nature of God and the love God has for us in the One who comes, the One whose Incarnation we will celebrate, we wait and we prepare with hope rather than fear in our hearts. As we read (above) from Hebrews 6: "... we who have fled to take hold of the hope set before us may be greatly encouraged. We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure. It enters the inner sanctuary behind the curtain, where our forerunner, Jesus, has entered on our behalf." Our hope is not in our own faith. Our hope is not in the things of this world. Our hope is surely NOT in the result of elections or in the earthly leaders that have been elected. Our hope is in the Lord and in what God has done for us in Jesus Christ. Our hope is in the love that God has for us and for the world. In I John 4 we read that perfect love cast out fear. So, we don't look at either the

present or the future in fear. We do not allow despair to rob us of the peace and the joy we have in Christ.

In these days following the election, there are some who are flying high, excited about what is to come in a new administration. At the same time, there are some who are filled with dread for their own situation or of what is to come for certain populations who have been spoken and acted against.

Just this afternoon I had a Facebook conversation with an old friend who is afraid of the coming political realities, shall we say. She is afraid of what is to come. I try very hard to caution against fear. Here's how I replied to her:

"All due respect, old friend, but if Christ is Lord, Trump isn't. Neither would Harris have been. We don't have reason for hope if our candidate wins and we don't give up that hope and fall into despair because the other candidate won.

I still wake up, say my prayers that God's will be done through me and through all God's people and by God's own sovereign power. Then I get about the business that God has given me to do in the world. I don't let my fear paralyze me or rob me of that peace and joy that is rooted in the love God has poured into me and into Christ's Church. I get busy loving my neighbor and even my enemies (as God empowers me, for I cannot do it in my own power). I care for those in need, striving to do more if that is called for as I have concerns that others in authority might abandon some of the most needy.

I am not blind to the concerns that so many are raising but I will not give up my peace and my joy out of fear."

I'm as political as the next person but my hope is not in the political process or in our elected leaders. Last Sunday we read from Psalm 146: "Put not your trust in rulers, in mortals in whom there is no help. When they breathe their last, they return to earth, and in that day their thoughts perish." The first Christians, the early Church, lived out their faith in the middle of a pagan empire that in no way supported their faith or their moral values. They did so regardless of who was in charge in the world. As Jesus taught, they rendered "unto Caesar what was Caesar's and to God what was God's." As the apostles declared to the religious authorities who had arrested them, "We must obey God rather than any human authority."

It is Advent and our hope is in the Lord who comes to us, the One who gave everything, accepting his own death on the cross, that we might be reconciled to God. We live with hope. We live with peace and even joy that comes from within our hearts that have been transformed by the gracious saving love of God in Jesus Christ.

A Call to Serve: Bishop deForest on Living Faithfully in Today's World

"I may be saved for all eternity, just like all of you [in worship this morning]. But I want my first moments in eternity to be surrounded more by people I helped than by people I hurt; by more celebration than condemnation; and by a Jesus more glad at me than mad at me."

This excerpt from Bishop Christopher deForest's sermon, preached during a service at Maidencreek in Blandon on November 10, captures the heart of his message.

The Gospel lectionary for November 10 was Mark 12:38-44, where Jesus observes people putting money into the temple treasury, noticing a poor widow contributing two small copper coins—all she had to live on. Jesus explains to his disciples that the widow has put in more than all the others, as she gave out of her poverty, while they gave out of their wealth.

Bishop deForest focused his sermon on Lutheranism, particularly since that Sunday was also Martin Luther's birthday. "Martin Luther himself would likely say that this story from the Gospel of Mark is a great example of the kind of things that got Luther all worked up in the first place," said Bishop deForest. He argued that Jesus would not want us just to "be like the widow" or celebrate "sacrificial giving" or "cheerful givers" as illustrated by the widow. Rather, he pointed out that Jesus was expressing strong anger at a system that ignored the plight of the poor and those harmed by economic inequalities and injustice. Bishop deForest compared Jesus' angry response in the Gospel of Mark to the time when Jesus overturned the tables in the temple.

He also paralleled the recent election with Jesus' reaction to the widow's offering.

people "Lots of voted, in similar anger. They - or someone they love, care about, feel concern for - are being forgotten," he noted. He reminded us that regardless of political affiliations, Christ died came to save all of us. Quoting John 3:16, he said, "God so loved the world,



that God gave God's only son, that everyone who believes in him, may not perish but may have eternal life." He emphasized, "Eternal life. Forever. Which I will spend, with these same folks. On all sides." That includes the widows and the scribes. The elites and the forgotten. The celebrities and the nobodies.

Bishop deForest concluded his sermon with a call to action: "While we're still here, and

we can still offer love like Jesus. healing like Jesus, side-by-side and engagement like Jesus - with our friends and enemies. strangers and neighbors well then, Jesus calls us out, the same as all his disciples - to get to work, while we can."
