

"Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." - 1 Thessalonians 5:18

I have always been a left-brained logic-minded person -- structure, order, facts. One of the ways that I keep things together is by using a planner. I do have a digital calendar, but I find that using a big and bulky daily planner is still best suited to my style of organization. Always on the lookout for new things, I decided last year to try a different planner. This one was different. Where my last planner simply asked me to enter appointments and gave me a space to track how much time I spent on each task, this planner asked something vastly different from me. Each day, three small blocks. "What are you grateful for today?"

At first, I thought it was a bit silly. If I wanted to be creative, three things each day times 365 days meant 1,095 different things for which to be grateful! My anxiety shifted between thinking of something meaningful and not wanting to leave blocks blank. I started with the normal stuff -- friends, family, a home, a job -- indeed the things I normally gave thanks to God for in prayer.

A few months later, and the season of Lent begins. Lent is a time of reflection and, admittedly, the time of year that I spend the most time in prayer. During Lent, I prayed to be more thankful. "Help me, God, to know what's important!" Suddenly, 1,095 different things for which to be grateful was not a perplexing task. I would start my day and remember that person who sent a card to me last week. Their name goes in a blank. I would remember the great weather the day before. That goes in a blank. I would check my blood sugar and see a decent number for once! That goes in a blank. I would remember the times God manifested Himself during a challenging time. That event goes in a blank, even if it was hard to get through.

St. Paul reminds us to give thanks in all things. It seems silly. There are some things in my life that do not immediately scream, "This deserves a thank you." Even so, gratitude in the good and bad does transform the way you see the world around you. It transforms how you see God, how you see others, and how you see yourself.

I am incredibly grateful to all of you and for many and assorted reasons for the different gifts you bring to our common life together. Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good! And his steadfast love endures forever.

Veterans Day began as Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I on November 11, 1918. It became a federal holiday in 1938, and in 1954, after lobbying by World War II and Korean War veterans, the holiday was renamed Veterans Day to honor all Americans who have served in the U.S. military, not just those from WWI.

From Armistice Day to Veterans Day

- 1918:
 - The armistice that ended World War I was signed on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.
- 1919:
 - President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first Armistice Day to honor WWI veterans.
- 1938:
 - November 11 was declared a national holiday, dedicated to world peace and the veterans of the Great War.
- <u>1954:</u>
 - U.S. Representative <u>Ed Rees</u> proposed a bill to change the name, and President <u>Dwight D. Eisenhower</u> signed it into law, officially changing the holiday to Veterans Day to honor all U.S. veterans.

Why the Name Change?

- Following World War II and the Korean War, veterans and veterans service organizations successfully pushed for a holiday that was more inclusive of all who served.
- The name change from Armistice Day to Veterans Day was supported by figures like World War II
 veteran <u>Raymond Weeks</u>, who organized the first national Veterans Day celebration in Alabama in 1947.
 Key Aspects of Veterans Day
- Honoring All Service Members: Unlike Memorial Day, which honors those who died in service, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans, living or deceased.
- **Federal Holiday:** Veterans Day is a federal holiday, meaning most government offices, schools, and banks are closed.
- Annual Observance: The holiday continues to be observed annually on November 11.



Do Justice, Love Kindness, Walk Humbly: The Work of the Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania

In a well-known scripture, the prophet Micah proclaims, "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (NRSV Micah 6:8) It has been pointed out that we Lutherans often are more comfortable loving justice and doing kindness; that is, we find satisfaction in feeding hungry people but shy away from calling out and addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty. For the past 46 years, Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania (LAMPa) – funded in part by your mission support giving – has taken up the important, but daunting task of working to change systems that perpetuate inequity and injustice.

LAMPa's staff – Tracey DePasquale, Director, and Pastor Erin Jones, Communications and Advocacy Engagement Manager, joined this year by Hunger Advocacy Fellow, Daniella Garber – work with a Policy Council composed of representatives of

Pennsylvania's seven synods, the United Lutheran Seminary, and a synod bishop to develop a biennial Policy Agenda that guides our church's engagement with state legislators and departments in the governor's office.

The current Policy Agenda includes the following priorities:

- Hunger: improving access to healthy, affordable food;
- Creation Care: advocating for laws that protect clean air, water, and land;
- Poverty: addressing homelessness and housing insecurity;
- Education: working toward adequate and equitable school funding;
- · Healthcare: working to ensure all Pennsylvanians have access to affordable care;
- Civil Rights: working to reduce hate crime and safeguard the right to vote;
- Immigration: standing for welcome to our newest neighbors; and
- Violence Reduction: addressing the root causes of violence, including trauma and extreme poverty.

The LAMPa staff and Policy Council pursue this ambitious agenda in several ways:

- By forming and participating in coalitions with leaders of other denominations, faith-based organizations, and community groups that are passionate about these same issues;
- By engaging with state legislators and those who work in the governor's office, regardless of party affiliation, to advance measures that benefit all Pennsylvanians;
- And, most important, by equipping and supporting the members of the 1,050 ELCA congregations in Pennsylvania so that each of us becomes more confident expressing our faith in the Good News of Jesus by becoming bold advocates for a just and compassionate

society. The widely used Bonhoeffer curriculum is just one example of this.
